How to Find Full-text Articles at St. Joseph's

Finding Full-text Using PubMed

Access PubMed through the Library's website. Go to the hospital's website at <http://www.stjosephshealth.org> and click on the book icon in the lower right to access the library's pages. The library staff has set up links from PubMed abstracts to let you know how to access full-text articles. Select "Literature Searches and Databases" from the menu on the left, then select "Search Medline using PubMed." You can limit your search to articles available through our library by adding this to your search: [AND loprovsjhmclib\[sb\]](#)



This icon links to the online, full-text article.



This icon means that the library has the journal in print in the library. We can help you find the journal issue on the shelf and you can photocopy the article you need.

Finding Full-text Using CINAHL (Cumulative Index of Nursing and Allied Health Literature) or other EBSCOhost database

Searching these databases will provide you with links to full-text articles that are included within the EBSCOhost system.

Finding Full-text when you have a journal citation

If you have a journal citation, you may check the library's "A to Z" journal listing. This is linked from the library's website under "The Library's Collection" and then select "Online Journals." Search the journal list by the name of the journal. If the library provides access to a journal online or in the physical library, it will be noted here.

This shows that the library has online access from a variety of sources. Check the dates of online coverage before clicking on a hyperlink. This listing also shows that the library has a print subscription to the journal. Print subscriptions may be important to you when you need to see classified ads and certain other content that is not always included in the online version of a journal.

How can I print the article?

Look for a link to the "pdf" file. While every publisher has a different layout, most have a link to the pdf version of the article. "Pdf" stands for Portable Document Format, and is an actual image of the article as it appeared in the print journal. Look for the words "PDF" or this image:



Make sure you are using the printer icon within the pdf article window. **DO NOT** use the printer icon or print command from Internet Explorer or it will not print.

Occasionally, older articles will not have a pdf available. In that case, preview your document in Internet Explorer using the menu selection **File > Print Preview** to make sure all of the text will be included. You may need to change the paper orientation from "Portrait" to "Landscape" using the menu selection **File > Page Setup**.

Occasionally, the library printers default to the wrong printer. Please be sure that the selected printer is "RICOH" or "LANIER".

What if I still can't find full-text?

Please do not pay for any articles. The library staff can assist you in finding journal articles, and, if necessary, we will order the article you need from another library. Turnaround time for interlibrary loans is generally less than 48 hours, and can be "rushed" if needed for direct patient care.
